#### **Rules and regulations**

- The Muckhart & District Horticultural Society is a constituted Society. Copies of the constitution are available on the Society Website or by email from the Secretary.
- 2. Society competitions are open to all. Each article sent in for competition must have attached a Competition Label supplied by the Society, price IOp each. Failing this the article will be laid aside.
- 3. All specimens must be staged by 9.30am on the day of the Show which will be open to the public from 2.00pm. The Show Room will be open for the reception of articles for Competition from 7.00pm to 9.00pm on the evening preceding the show. Please don't pick up until after 3.30 pm on Saturday.
- 4. No competitor to exhibit more than the specified quantity of any article. Vegetables to be shorn of all superfluous leaves. Competitors are requested to show articles for competition in as neat a style as possible. Articles shown in the Industrial section must be new and unlaundered.
- 5. No competitor will be allowed to stage more than one lot for any one prize.
- 6. In any competition where there are two prizes and only one competitor the Committee reserves full power to award only the second prize if necessary.
- 7. Where there is equality in points prizes, number of first prizes shall decide, thereafter the number of second prizes.
- 8. All entries must be the exhibitors' own work.
- 9. Points that go towards the awarding of the cups are awarded for 1st, 2nd and 3rd places.
- 10. Only children will be awarded a cash prize and only for first place.

# **Other Information**

- You can buy raffle tickets and pay for your tea at the same time in the entrance hall.
   We have a card payment machine, or you can pay by cash.
- There is also a coffee/tea and cake takeaway table in the hall if you are short of time.

# Handy hints for exhibitors

The following notes have been prepared by Show judges and are intended to be a guide for exhibitors as to what the judges look for in an exhibit.

**Preserves -** Jars should be well filled, clearly labelled and clean on the outside. The contents should be sealed in with either cellophane and waxed paper discs or screw top lids/metal covers. The skins of fruit should be soft. Jams and jellies should be bright with an attractive sparkle.

**Baking** - Crispness is the most important factor in any biscuit or shortbread. Be careful when lining cake tins with paper to ensure there are no creases. Tablet should break crisply but melt smoothly in the mouth. Gingerbread must taste of ginger and no other spices.

**Vegetables & Flowers** - The definitive guide to the exhibiting and judging of flowers, vegetables (and fruit) is the Royal Horticultural Society's 'The Horticultural Show Handbook' which gives all you need to know about organising, judging or competing in a show. The following notes are based on the guidance given in this Handbook. It has not been possible to give information for individual types but the following notes hopefully give an idea of what the judge is looking for.

**Vegetables** - In assessing the merits of exhibits of vegetables the following features are usually considered - condition, size and uniformity.

**Condition** - Cleanliness, freshness, tenderness and presence or absence of coarseness and blemishes.

**Size** - This is important if accompanied by quality (but only in those circumstances) as the production of large specimens of good quality requires more skill than growing small specimens.

Flowers & Ornamental Plants - In assessing the merits of most exhibits of flowers and pot plants consideration should be given to condition and uniformity.

**Condition** - Exhibits in good condition are fresh and free from damage due to weather, pests, diseases and faulty handling, have good colour and form. Stems

should be sturdy and straight and in proportion to flower size. **Uniformity** - An exhibit is uniform when individual plants are alike in age, size and form. And remember, biggest does not necessarily mean best as the judge will favour a set of similar size and shape exhibits over an ill matched entry of similar quality, even if they are bigger.

**Floral Art** - Flowers and foliage used in floral art exhibits do not need to be home grown, other than those for Class 101, 'A jug of flowers fresh from the garden'. The comments above regarding flower and foliage also apply to material used in floral art exhibits so make sure it is as fresh as possible and free from blemishes. If you are using oasis (not recommended) or some other base material in an arrangement, make sure it is totally hidden and secure. Think about the title/description, the judge will be looking for your ideas on it e.g. choice of container, plant material, colours, shapes, lines, textures. Accessories are allowed unless otherwise stated.

One of our committee members gives tips for using **Peat Free compost.** 'What I've learned using Peat Free compost for a number of years. As it is harder to wet efficiently and can dry out easily, I add some sharp sand, horticultural grit and/or vermiculite (perlite would work equally well as far as I can tell). I always water seed trays and seedlings from the bottom.

It's not easy to be precise over mix. I add a little bit at a time till it seems right depending on whether I'm sowing seeds, potting on or filling containers. I use added grit mainly in my containers, not for seed sowing.

I find that I do need to buy special seed sowing compost (which is now becoming available with peat substitute too, I understand) for very fine seed but bigger seeds like beans, sweet peas, cosmos do fine in the regular multipurpose. With extra tweaking, i.e. more sand or perlite, multipurpose would maybe work for fine seeds too, as seeds don't need much goodness till after they have their second set of leaves.

There is some good information on the RHS website about all types of composts and also suggested mixes to make your own.'
